Overall Theme of Course				This course provides an introduction to the basic concepts and theoretical perspectives used in sociology. The goal of this course is to study the interrelations between society and the individual in regard to generic social processes. Specifically, we will consider the ways that we are both constrained as well as empowered by society via the roles and cultural understandings that form the basis of human interaction. This course also provides an introduction to several sociological topics that represent the sociological way of viewing the world. The topics covered include culture, socialization, gender, and social inequality.
